

Renowned sculptor who created Vietnam Women's Memorial dies at age 80





Born in 1939 in Lubbock, Texas, Goodacre graduated from Colorado College and studied at the Art Students League of New York. She began her artistic life as a painter but became known for three-dimensional work that focused on the figure.

Her first small bronze sculpture was cast in 1969 by the writer and treasure-hider Forrest Fenn, who had a foundry and gallery in Lubbock. In 1973, when Fenn opened his gallery in Santa Fe, Goodacre's art was on display from the first day.

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The Vietnam Women's Memorial, dedicated Nov. 11, 1993, depicts three uniformed nurses caring for a wounded soldier and honors women who risked their lives to serve their country.

"My desire to create a lasting tribute to the American women serving in Vietnam is founded upon my deep respect for each of them, and my heartfelt prayer for their 'healing and hope,' "Goodacre wrote in her sculptor's notes.

"I have been humbled by the enormity of such a task yet incredibly honored by the overwhelming gratitude of the veterans. The emphasis of this tribute is centered on their emotions: their compassion, their anxiety, their fatigue, and above all, their dedication. That my hands can shape the clay which might touch the hearts and heal the wounds of those who served fills me with humility and deep satisfaction."

Goodacre died on 13 April, 2020.

Do you remember the French architecture and the tree lined streets? The roof top terrace bars of the Continental, Caravelle and Rex Hotels?

You can picture Graham Greene banging away at his typewriter in his room at the Continental writing his novel *The Quiet American*. But, that was 1955. When our war was in full swing it was American G.I.'s not expats who lined the bars in Saigon.

Not all Americans were lucky enough to ever visit Saigon much less share a few cocktails at the old remnants of the French colonial empire. Some did though. Some small units were even put up in hotels, at least for a short while until the war machine really went into high gear.

G.I.'s in Saigon's bars became a common sight in the 60's and 70's. Tu Do Street was a sought after visit for those lucky enough to wrangle a visit.

Columbia Asia Hospital is a modern facility located in Binh Duong Province. It is actually on Highway 13, about halfway between Phu Loi and Di An. Remembering the area from 1970-1972 I can't imagine this.

Factories and offices in the area had attracted a large population of foreigners, namely Korean and Japanese, yet the closest international medical services were all located far away in the center of Saigon. As the first international hospital established in the area, it was built to meet the medical needs of the foreign and local communities alike. With 100 patient beds, the two-story building allows for a smooth patient flow while new medical technologies decrease the number of invasive treatments and optimize the efficiency of patient care resulting in shorter stays.

Columbia Asia is a multinational chain of hospitals in Asia with 29 medical facilities spread across Malaysia, India, Indonesia, and Vietnam that all adhere to the same strict standard operating procedures. 
