


IN MEMORIAM

Joseph (Jay) Tirre, LTC Retired 1935 - 2014

I am sad to report that we have lost one of our registered AVEL Veterans. Jay was the commanding officer of AVEL North in 1968. He had been suffering the effects of Agent Orange.

Jay had prostate cancer for about 7 years but it had been under control with hormone therapy until just before Christmas when his midriff became painful to the touch. Tests revealed the cancer had spread into his liver and had done so very rapidly. He received the first chemo treatment the week of Christmas and by Sunday the reaction had caused severe diarrhea and dehydration. He was admitted that night to ICU when his blood pressure tanked and he passed away Monday, December 29th.





Jay was born on 12 February 1935, the son of Joseph & Florence Cutler Tirre. He is survived by his wife Lois Fichter Tirre and five sons: Conrad, William, Scott, Steve and Michael. He had seven grandchildren.

He had a long and distinguished Army career.

Jay attended the United States Military Academy at West Point graduation in 1958. He was a helicopter pilot and was Airborne qualified.

His first assignment after graduation was with the 34th Signal Bn. Where he served from 1959 - 1963.

In 1963 he was assigned to the Army Training & Support System and then to Army Aviation School where he remained until 1965. His next assignment was in the Republic of Vietnam.

Jay's first tour of duty in Vietnam was with Headquarters, 13th Aviation Bn. In the Delta. He served there from 1965 and 1966. For his service there he was awarded a *Bronze Star Medal and 3 Air Medals*. Upon his return from Vietnam he was assigned to the Aviation Electronics Agency.

His second Vietnam tour began in 1968 where he served as the Commanding Officer of **AVEL North**. He was then sent to the 34th General Support Group in Saigon. For his service in this tour he was awarded a **Bronze Star Medal and 6 Air Medals**.

When he returned to the States he was again assigned to the Aviation Electronics Agency where he was awarded the *Army Commendation Medal*.

He attended Command and General Staff College in 1972. He received his MBA in 1973 then was assigned to the Joint Military Advisory Group in Iran where he served from 1972-1973. He then served at Headquarters, Army Training and Doctrine Command from 1975 until his retirement as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1978. For his service there he was awarded the *Meritorious Service Medal*.

After his retirement from the Army he worked for Rockwell International until his retirement in 1993.

His family will bury his ashes at West Point on 17 April 2014.

Agent Orange and AVEL

Over the years I have heard AVEL Veterans say "I was never in the field, I wasn't exposed" or "they didn't spray that near us". Well, you are wrong. You were exposed and they did spray by you.

Let's look at exposure. You worked in a trailer. Never left the post for your entire year. How could you be exposed? Think about it. Every piece of equipment that came in for repair was off a helicopter or aircraft that was in Agent Orange territory. The equipment came in with dust. Dust that contained Agent Orange. The first thing you did was clean the equipment, usually with an air hose. EXPOSURE!



Spraying – were you sprayed? In Phu Loi they had a Huey that was equipped with a sprayer and sprayed insect killer over the base to keep Malaria down. It flew either early in the morning or late in the evening. During the day it sprayed Agent Orange. They didn't clean the equipment between missions. I know this was done over most bases besides Phu Loi. SPRAYED

Anything else? Well at Phu Loi (and I am sure most other bases) we had a ¾ ton truck with a 55 gallon drum of Agent Orange on it. Some of our troops would spray our sector of the perimeter with it so we had a clear field of fire. These troops were exposed. Those who served on the bunker line were exposed.

Let's look at the statistics. I examined the rosters of registered AVEL Veterans and those veterans that have died since their tour whose cause of death is known. The statistics of those with Agent Orange related illnesses are shown below.

AVEL Far North/ 263rd LEM: 32.2% AVEL North/614th LEM: 23.4%

AVEL Central: 25.9%

AVEL South/317th LEM: 37.8%

What is the upshot of this? Have you gone to the VA for your Agent Orange Assessment? If not, you need to. Get it on record.

Is this about filing a claim? Getting a check? No. It is about YOUR health. And, the health of your family. Take care of yourself men. Take care of your family. If you are sick from Agent Orange, file a claim. It is owed to you and your family.

So many men were killed in Vietnam but just haven't died yet.
